and events are always a hit and our June-13th meeting was no exception. Whether it was in anticipation of a great program, or follow-up from our annual show, we had a great turnout of current members, new members and prospective members present.

Our demonstrators - MaryE, RonF, and TimO all did splendid work in transforming rough stock into good bonsai, explaining what they saw as the positive and challenging aspects of the material. As an unplanned, serendipitous bonus they worked on three different species: American Larch, Honeysuckle,

and Bluestar Juniper; two conifers and one broadleaf; a nice mix and variety of material. We used all the available seats and still had a few folks standing.

Wins & Losses

Years ago I recall reading that one shouldn't even try to germinate cherry pits because they would never sprout. As I mentioned in the last newsletter there are a few YouTube videos about how to succeed in doing this. Here is the condensed version: eat some cherries (this is the easy part). Next, crack open the pit to extract the seed (I used a needle nose pliers that has a circular portion that is just the perfect size). The pit is very hard and you want to open it without smashing the interior - so don't whale on it with a hammer. You should also wear some eye protection, because the fragments sometimes fly off. Once the seed is extracted put it in damp paper towel and place it in a plastic bag then place the bag in the refrigerator for seven days (cold stratification). After those seven days, remove the seeds from the fridge. Peal off a thin covering that should now be easily separated from the rest of the seed. This resembles the red husk that covers a peanut, but it is only slightly colored.

Take the now exposed inner seed and put it back into the damp paper towel and put it back in the refrigerator for another week. When you remove the seed after this period you will probably see that the seed is starting to germinate. Gently bury the seed in potting soil at a depth of about double the seed size. Place outdoors where the critters can't dig it up, and after a week or two you will see shoots emerging. I planted 24 seeds; 16 germinated. WIN!

Still no signs of the gingko seeds doing anything; anyone else having similar or better luck with those seeds from March? LOSS?

Azaleas and other flowering bonsai

Don't allow your flowering bonsai to produce seed (a few crabapples / cherries are okay but only a few). We want the energy to go into branch and leaf formation – not seeds. So when your tree is finished flowering, pinch off the ovule with your fingers.

Be sure that you are removing the seed and not just the spent petals

... remember, bringing something to the meeting to show and tell about, gets you an additional ticket for meeting door prizes.

Karl showed how a large plastic container, in this case an "Utz Cheese Ball" container (11" tall x 9" diameter) can be used to create a humidity controlling greenhouse environment; add holes as needed for ventilation. Karl first saw this being used when visiting BC Bonsai (Wheaton-IL) in March-2019.
