President's Message

Review National Bonsai Exhibit

At the Feb-2020 meeting we will start our clubs "mission-for-2020" to experience the contents of the National Bonsai Foundation's display exhibits of the National Bonsai and Penjing Museum, at the National Arboretum.

If you don't already know this, the National Arboretum in Washington D.C. has three magnificent collections of bonsai.

There is the Japanese collection, consisting of 53 trees, which were gifted to the United States in honor of the U.S. bi-centennial celebration in 1976.

There is the Chinese collection of 36 trees, which were gifted by Dr. Yee-sun Wu, along with funds for the construction of the Chinese pavilion for displaying them.

Lastly, there exists the North American collection: "The North American Collection is displayed in the John Y. Naka North American Pavilion and the tropical species of these trees are found in the Haruo Kaneshiro Tropical Conservatory. All of the 63 trees that make up the collection are the work of people who live in North America."

As an aside, it is interesting (and sad) to note how many of these donors are no longer living. How appropriate that their prized trees are being cared for and on display in our nation's Capitol! --- Karl

We will start "our-mission" at the Feb-2020 meeting with an internet viewing of the North American Collection and then a review and discussion of the meeting attendees' 5 favorite trees from this collection. (See page 4 for more details, and how you can prepare in advance, as we will not have much time to view each tree at the meeting.)

At subsequent BBS-meetings in 2020, probably in April & September we will explore the remaining Japanese and Chinese collections; then also have a subsequent review and ranking of each set of "BBS-top-5".

And to "finish-off", why wouldn't we also review the Viewing Stones collection in December (when we generally have a presentation on Suiseki). The National Bonsai Foundation was founded in 1982. Its primary purpose is / was to raise funds for the construction and display of these three bonsai collections. The entire complex housing these three collections was accomplished with no federal or taxpayer money. It has come into existence solely through the love and support of bonsai aficionados from all around the world.

Their excellent website allows the public the opportunity to at least "get a glimpse" to review and inspire, without travelling to DC ... and who knows, might entice you enough to add a trip to this museum to your personal bucket list.

Cleaning Pots:

A few days ago I noticed that my indoor bonsai had an unsightly build-up of lime and fertilizer residue around the top rim of the pot. Outside, this isn't much of a problem, as the slightly acidic rainwater keeps this build-up in check. In the winter I am watering my tropicals with tap water (well water) which here in Madison contains significant lime. This probably also raises the pH of the soil. I have never measured this, but it seems to not have any harmful effects on the bonsai; but, it does make the pots 'untidy'. Your fingernail, or a wooden popsicle stick, work well for scraping this residue off. It only takes a few moments and you will be rewarded with a much neater appearance. If the pot is empty, an even easier approach is to soak it overnight in denture cleaner. Yup, denture cleaner. This was suggested to me by "Bonsai-Bob" years ago and I finally got around to trying it. It works.

New Discoveries:

After doing bonsai for almost fifty years I am still making new discoveries. It probably means I am a little slow on the uptake, and even worse at the retention. Last summer I found a dwarf Hinoki cypress cultivar called 'Sekka' - a beautiful little tree with small, dense foliage. The

tree had a nice main trunk with lots of branches, most growing upwards - almost parallel to the trunk. The branches had lots of foliage on the outside, because that is where the sunlight was available, but nothing on the inside facing the trunk. When I wired and bent the branches to a horizontal position, that put all the foliage on the bottom of the branch, and nothing on the top. So the branches ended up being upside down from what we want - that is, branch on the bottom with foliage on the top. Now that sunlight can reach the topside of the branches, the tree will respond and produce foliage on the top, so I am not worried about the long-term outlook. It just wasn't as 'instant' as I had hoped. It was more obvious on this tree because the foliage was so dense that no light got into the interior. — Karl

Chamaecyparis obtusa 'Sekka'

Sekka hinoki cypress have a compact growth habit which are excellent for small and shohin bonsai. The dark green foliage is tight and must be thinned out to find the branches. The foliage is quite tight and tends not to die back.

Note the mostly vertical growth of the prebonsai (about 12" tall at left) and an example of a fully developed and styled 'Sekka' bonsai on the right.

Details of North American Collection BBS-review ...

As was mentioned earlier, at the Feb-2020 meeting, there will not be much time to "dwell" on each image of the 63 trees in the North American Collection. We plan to do a "quick-pass-through" viewing of each tree in full screen display mode, but probably spending no more than 20 seconds a tree, to allow each member in attendance to select their personal favorite 5 trees from the collection.

To assist in this, Wayne has prepared a "cheat-sheet" of 1" x 1" thumbnail images from their website, along with the "pop-up" text information for each image, as well as a simple polling method to be used on conjuncation with this "cheat-sheet". After this first pass viewing, we will move onto other meeting business, during which we will collect attendees' votes and determine the "BBS-top-5 trees". Then we will come back to these 5 trees and spend the balance of the meeting discussing those 5 trees.

Now obviously 20 seconds is not a lot of time for to form a serious assessment, opinion and ranking of 63 trees. SO ... your homework assignment is to visit the collection (at this link) in advance of our meeting, click on first of the thumbnail-images on the website to start a nearly-full screen slide-show presentation of all 63 trees; arrows to the left and right let you move through all the trees. Note that if you hover your web-cursor over the image, the relevant text about the tree will come up, although we hope that information will not bias your assessments.

This way you can spend as much time as you desire to enjoy the beauty of these trees and if you desire, jot down your thoughts about some or all of the trees, and perhaps be able to describe what puts a tree into "your-top-5". Depending on the level of interest, the critique may continue into the March meeting.

To assist you in your own personnel review, you can download the <u>6-page "cheat sheet"</u> in advance; and remember to bring this to the meeting. (Thumbnail images and text used for our personal reference and our BBS-meeting review are used with permission of the National Bonsai Federation.)

You can also download <u>the polling-tally</u> which will reference the page (1 to 6), the row (1 to 5), and the column (left or right) of the cheat sheet in order to identify your top-5 favorites.
