Recap of Dec-9th meeting

Karl presented an overview of Suiseki, with many amazing pictures, and a few guest examples of striking beauty. In addition, guest and former BBS member Tony Ankowicz gave a truly fascinating presentation on Viewing Stones, many of which he harvests while snorkling in the Great Lakes. Some interesting comments from Tony are:

- Geology is to Viewing Stones as Botany is to Bonsai
- We loose our sense of scale when looking at 3D art in a 2D format ...
 This is advantageous when presenting Landscape Stones (or Bonsai), but without listed measurements, a photo can be deceiving.











Bloodgood Japanese Maple

All Japanese maples are beautiful. But the cultivar 'Bloodgood' has few equals. About thirty years ago BobE and I were at an end-of-year auction at the Toddle In Nursery on highway 51 just south of McFarland. One of the many items that were to be sold were 1-gallon Bloodgoods. As I recall my winning bid was \$7, so I bought

them all. There were 10 or 12 trees in the lot. I gave some away and lost a few. I put one in the ground 30 years ago and it did fine until the polar vortex three years ago



killed a portion of the tree, and completely killed a JM viridis.

I was recently surprised to discover the origin of the name 'Bloodgood'. I had assumed that it was a reference to the beautiful red foliage that the tree has. Wrong! It turns out that Bloodgood was the name of a nursery in New York, one of the earliest if not the earliest in the US. Bloodgood was the family name of the operators. Somewhere around the time of the Civil War they began to sell this Japanese maple. Here is a quote from the Maple Ridge Nursery web site: Many people believe that Acer palmatum 'Bloodgood' was named for its dark red color, but it was actually named in the late 19th century by Bloodgood Nursery in New York. Bloodgood Nursery was the first American nursery to sell this tree, so they named it after their own nursery. It is unclear where they first received the tree, because trees were not actively coming out of Japan at that time. It is thought that Bloodgood Nursery likely received the tree from the Netherlands as a select Atropurpureum that was displaying exceptionally nice color.

Regardless of its origins, Bloodgood is probably the most popular Japanese maple in the world and has become the standard by which all other red upright Japanese maples are judged. Acer palmatum 'Bloodgood' was also a recipient of the prestigious Award of Garden Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society for its outstanding qualities. --- *Karl*

Ficus
