President's Message

Just a few days into March and already we are seeing signs that our trees will soon be coming out of their dormancy with increasing sun and the return of moderate temperatures. However you still need to keep an eye on the rapidly shifting weather – 60°F temps one day, then 30°F the next day – before you decide to pull your trees out of their winter storage. Once you do feel it is safe to bring them out, remember to transition them slowly into their normal sun exposure and monitor their watering needs carefully.

Regardless of whether that is days or weeks off yet, make sure that you have a plan to examine your trees for any signs of damage that might need special care ... Karl relates a recent experience with a Ficus that demonstrates the ease of working with these trees that Zach talked about at the Feb-10th meeting. In addition, be

sure that you have your supplies (soil mixes, fertilizers, pots / containers) and tools ready for when you start working on your trees again. And don't forget to clean and sharpen your tools.

Another thing to keep in mind is our mentoring session on Sat, Apr-2nd afternoon at Olbrich, where you can bring in your tree(s) for discussion, guidance or some minor working ... or just to watch or get involved in a variety of bonsai-related topics.

Our Feb-10th meeting at Olbrich Gardens had a total of 19 attendees, with 1 new member Colin, with Zach presenting a very interesting presentation on Ficus for bonsai. --- Wayne

Recap of Feb-10th meeting

The membership approved RonF and ZachW as new board-members-at-large, and Gary circulated the summary of the BBS Treasury for 2021. Ken brought in a little leaf begonia that he found at a local store. BenKo talked about California bonsai pots, Brian showed a Ficus. BenKo also picked up the gifted azalea to see if he can nurse it back to health. In addition, we discussed a possibility of a soil mixing session (not during a meeting) in March; update on library agreement with Olbrich; April-2nd workshop at Olbrich; and Mary updated the membership on by-law revisions and plan for distribution then voting at the Mar-10th meeting. We also presented the poster for the Annual Show in May ... thanks to Lisa for all her work to develop the poster, the image selected is a tree of TimO's from the 2021 Annual Show. And finally Zach gave a very interesting presentation on Ficus varieties, care guide and propagation methods, as well as showing many examples from his collection.









Ficus Survival

Every once in a while the gods smile on you - even when you don't deserve it. I put together this three-tree grove of ficus about two or three years ago. And while it's not great, it's not too bad, especially considering its from cuttings. The hyper tufa



slab was made in a club workshop about 25 years ago. (I don't recall what I had growing on the slab originally, but it has sat empty for many years.) Hyper tufa is interesting because you can wire brush the edges after the mixture has set up somewhat, but before it attains full hardness. This makes the slab look much more like actual rock.

When I brought the grove inside last fall, I didn't watch it closely enough. It dried out and promptly dropped all of its leaves. Shame on the owner. I continued to water when the soil dried a bit, and before too long it started to push out new growth. And then I let it get too dry a second time, and the new growth withered away. Double shame on the owner. I continued to water, but was not optimistic about its recovery. All of the tree's available stored energy was probably used up pushing out the now-withered new growth.

But, the gods granted me forgiveness a second time - another flush of new growth.



Not a lot, but enough that I am sure the two tallest trees will be okay.

The smallest tree on the left has withered (wrinkled) bark on the upper portion of the trunk, and that is always a sign that the cambium is dead. So if it sprouts it will have to be from the lower portion of the trunk. --- *Karl*
