Winter Stories



Paulo's Barbados cherry (*Malpighia emarginata*) didn't seem to realize it was in Wisconsin in December when it produced this singular fruit.

The Barbados cherry, also known as acerola cherry, Guarani cherry, West Indian cherry, and wild crepe myrtle, is native to Paraguay, Brazil, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, and Haiti. A popular bonsai specimen because of its small leaves and fruit and fine ramification, the Barbados cherry produces fruit from April to November in its native climate.



As of Christmas, many of Ken's collection was still outside exposed to the elements, which have been pretty mild so far this winter. Left outside, versus being put into protective cover, possibly too early, these temperate trees had the exposure to freezing temperatures they needed to put them into full dormancy, which is necessary for long-term health of the trees.

While in dormancy, deciduous bonsai and conifers don't need as much water as they did in the summer when moisture was lost through their leaves. Even when temperatures dropped into the 20s at night, Ken's trees were safe as long as they were protected from strong drying winds, big temperature drops at night, and fluctuations in temperature. Situated on the side of this building likely provided them adequate protection.



Sharon's Vietnamese blue bells (*Trifidacanthus unifoliolatus*) were in full bloom for the holidays. These tropical shrubs, which are native to China, Indonesia, the Philippines and Vietnam, make great bonsai specimens. Sharon says their scent reminds her of Fanta fruitflavored soda.
