

President's Message



Michael apprenticed with bonsai master Shinji Suzuki in Obuse, Japan from 2003 to 2006. He lives and practices bonsai in Portland Oregon, where he founded Crataegus Bonsai Garden and The Portland Bonsai Village. Michael is also the Bonsai Consultant for the Portland Japanese Garden. He teaches classes to students from around the world at his garden, and blogs at
