

July Meeting

To keep our bonsai healthy and thriving, it's important to understand how they use energy throughout the year. Tropical and temperate trees use energy differently. Ron's Energy Level diagram provides a visual that makes this complex topic easier to understand.




Temperate trees (top graph) go into the winter energy positive after spending the summer taking in resources via the process of photosynthesis. This energy strengthens the tree for winter and prepares it for the spring flush of new growth. In the spring energy continues to be depleted until new leaves harden off and start to do their jobs again, which is to photosynthesize and reaccumulate energy stores.

Tropical trees also build energy through the summer months when they are outside and can take in the highest light possible, that provided by the sun. During this time is when they achieve the most growth. Around October or November when the days become shorter and the temps become colder, tropicals begin to use more energy than they bring in. Because tropicals don't go into a dormancy period like temperate trees do, that energy gets depleted throughout the winter and doesn't begin to reaccumulate again until spring when the bonsai can once again be outside in the sun. Supplemental lighting can help during the winter months, but it will never be as strong as the sun, even in a south facing window.

Understanding the energy cycles of your bonsai tree will help you time activities like repotting, pruning, pinching, propagating, and fertilizing to minimize interference with the tree's natural rhythm. This promotes healthier growth, reduces stress, improves recovery, enhances vitality, and provides a better result overall.







The focus of our July meeting was on propagation and pruning of tropical bonsai. Zach brought in several of the beautiful Ficus he's been cultivating for years. The amazing thing about these trees is that most of them (maybe all of them) came from the cuttings of an original and were propagated by Zach. When Ficus have the right growing conditions, which in this case are full outdoor sun, fertilizer, and pruning, they grow quickly and are a great way to build an impressive collection. Zach demonstrated how he roots actual cuttings and showed us how he prunes. His drawn diagram of cutting back to two leaves to increase ramification was very helpful.

We were all beginners once and we've all been there. The promise offered by this recent Menards ad is too good to pass up. The 4.0 star ratings eliminate any skepticism. And you can't beat the price. A click on the ad on Menards' website revealed many people thought so - the kit was sold out.

But this kit and others seen on sites like Amazon won't deliver on its promises. Buyers might be able to get the seeds to germinate if they research the tree and provide the right conditions (the pine seeds need cold stratification), but they'll have a long wait before the trees begin to resemble the picture if the trees even live that long. A sizable investment in the proper tools, fertilization, growing medium, pots, and other necessities will add up to a many times more than the original money spent.

An investment in a BBS membership is much more rewarding. The knowledge and skills we are building by being members will allow us to grow trees like those pictured successfully many years faster than the time it would take for us to grow the trees in this kit.
