Repotting Bonsai

Why do we do it?

And how do we plan for it to be a successful event?

Reasons to repot

- · Water does not easily flow through the pot
- Tree needs to be repositioned in its current pot
- You want to move the tree to a new/different pot
- . Tree is in a mix that is too wet or dry
- To slow the growth of a tree (trees that are too strong)
- To accelerate the growth of a tree (trees that are weak)
- To develop the root spread and root system
- To get the tree into a mix that is manageable by the owner

Repotting as a technique to develop our trees.

- Refined deciduous trees are repotted yearly to slow down vigorous spring growth.
- · Refined conifers are allowed to become root bound to slow down vigorous spring growth.
- Repotting and soil mixes are a fundamental part of bonsai cultivation and should not be overlooked on your journey to creating beautiful bonsai.
- Trees that are in soil mixes that hold water for longer periods of time will grow slower.
- Trees that are in soil mixes that hold water for shorter periods of time will grow faster.
- If you find your trees are not developing the way you expect them to or the quality of the tree is no longer increasing year after year, the length of time the soil mix holds water may be a factor.

Questions to ask yourself when repotting

- Is there enough or too much room in the pot I selected?
- Is this the appropriate pot for the tree?
- Is the soil mix I have chosen going to cause the tree to grow too fast or too slow?
- Did I get the tree in the ideal position?
- Did I get the tree firmly anchored in the pot?
- Did I get the soil integrated properly with the roots without overly impacting them?

Timing - Best when the tree is energy positive

- Deciduous trees as buds are swelling, just as leaves are about to emerge or are just emerging; generally not once leaves are fully emerged.
- Deciduous conifers just before foliage emerges.
- · Conifers usually as the winter color is receding and th foliage is changing back to brighter green.
- Tropical trees usually early to mid summer, typically when they are more active.

Setting yourself up for a successful repot

- First and most important step is to create a space that provides plenty of room to easily preform the scope of work you are about to begin.
- Next, have the soil you intend to use prepared and ready for use. Sift soil one last time to remove more dust; every little bit helps.
- · Give yourself enough time to repot, it often takes longer than you estimated

March Meeting




At our March meeting Colin presented on pot artistry and some of the important modern potters.



Spring Roadtrip

Spring has sprung at Ancient Arts Bonsai, now in our 20th year of serving Wisconsin Bonsai hobbyists.

I just finished another successful livestock buying trip. This year I went to a new nursery, D&L Nursery in Florida, in addition to Brussel's Bonsai in Mississippi. Overall, it was a roughly 2,800 mile round trip. I brought back 85 trees, including several species I have not had before.

I look at thousands of trees to pick just a few with the potential to become great bonsai after years of care. I could just order X number of trees and live with the luck of the pick by the person filling the order, but unfortunately some of the trees in the nursery have flaws that will likely never be resolved for the tree

to become an aesthetically pleasing bonsai. I prefer to physically look at every tree so I can bring back the best specimens for my customers to turn into masterpieces. In the picture below I'm looking through several hundred white flowering Japanese Quince, from which I'll pick just four.

The trees chosen are packed into my van for the long ride home, then moved to my garage and winter hoop house, which remains in the 70's. After living in Florida, they won't like the Wisconsin weather until we get into more consistent temperature ranges.

If you are seeking a new tree with a few more years of development already on it, make an appointment to come see what is available now. Many of these bonsai are highly desirable and they will move fast.




