Septemberfest at Wisco Bonsai

A weekend of gorgeous weather was just the cherry on top of a fantastic event. From amazing trees, pots, tools, and of course, visiting artists, Septemberfest did not disappoint visitors to Wisco Bonsai in Sussex, WI.

This year, the event was held from the 26th-28th. Hosted by artist, entrepreneur, and Milwaukee Bonsai Society member Kevin Stoeveken, bonsai enthusiasts were invited to check out available pots, trees, and supplies. Artists Brian Susler and Houston Sanders of Milwaukee, Elle Nieto-BrodAnick of Chicago, and Mark Fields of Indianapolis graciously offered their talent to hold workshops over the weekend. This event was open to the public and the workshops allowed for silent observers.

Day 1 - The first day was a bring your own tree, beginner/intermediate workshop with Kevin. It was a great discussion for folks newer to bonsai. The biggest discussion was timely work on trees in Wisconsin. There are many guides and resources online regarding tree work, but it is important to know the climate your trees are kept in when deciding whether to cut back, wire, repot, or do nothing. The health of the tree can be compromised if we are not careful when we do our work.

Day 2 - Saturday featured Wisconsin's own, Brian Susler and Houston Sanders. Houston brought a selec-

tion of Japanese Maples

trees brought
in for advice

and guidance for styling those trees. His extensive knowledge of pines and junipers led to interesting discussions on the intricacies of tree health and how to successfully style these common bonsai.

Day 3 - Visiting artists, Elle Nieto-Brodnick and Mark Fields ended the weekend Sunday with two more awesome workshops. We brought our own trees to work on with Elle, and learned much about seasonal styling and wiring. An up and coming artist, it was a pleasure to meet and learn with her.

Mark Fields, who needs no introduction as a long-time bonsai artist and a champion of shohin bonsai, brought Itoigawa junipers for his class to work on. Each person took home a new tree, wired and styled with Mark's advice. Both artists stayed after their workshops to mingle with guests.

Elle demonstrated on a tree after the workshops concluded Sunday, and guests that stayed behind enjoyed a lively discussion.

As always, the best part of bonsai is the discussion and great conversation among friends and fellow bonsai enthusiasts.

The atmosphere at Wisco Bonsai is always conducive to good conversation and loose fun, but most importantly, learning about our trees!
